In the world of marathons, there is something even longer than the full marathon – the ultramarathon. I once competed a 100 km race outside the prefecture, and it was a grueling race that took all day from early morning to late evening. Apparently, there are races abroad that take more than a month to complete a distance of about 5,000 km. This distance is equivalent to travelling from Japan to Alaska in a straight line. Since there is also a time limit, the runner must run approximately 100 km every day to complete the race. Where to visit (in Seoul)




- Naksan Park:
This park has a beautiful night view. Good for a night walk.
- Tongin Market:
It is a place I would like to visit. At the popular "Obento cafe, you can buy your favorite side dish with old-fashioned copper coins.
- Seoul Forest:
A large park where you can feel the seasons of Korea. In the neighboring area called "Seongsu", there are many cute cafes and stores!
- National Hangeul Museum & National Museum of Korea:
It is an interesting place for those studying the Korean language. The adjacent National Museum of Korea is one of the most famous museums in Korea. It may be a good idea to visit the museums together. The merchandise of the National Museum of Korea are very popular, full of cute and traditional items and suitable for souvenirs.

What to eat



- Dak-bokkeum-tang: Spicy Korean Chicken Stew
- Gamja-tang: Pork bones and Potato soup
- Clam Kalguksu: Korean noodle soup with Clams
- Bean Sprouts Kukpap: Rice porridge with bean sprouts (A dish from my hometown of Jeonju!)
- Budae-jjigae: Spicy hot pot with sausage/spam
Japanese people seem to like this flavour.

Unique Korean dish (Not everyone's taste!)



- Dakbal: Spicy Chicken feet
- Sundae: Korean sausage
- Beondegi: Boiled and seasoned silkworm pupae

The Problem of Talking about Canada in Japan

It's always difficult to answer Japanese people's questions about Canada. Unlike Japan, we don't have a Canadian language, Canadian dance, Canadian cuisine, Canadian traditional costume, Canadian music, or any such things.

Therefore, questions such as "What is Canadian food?" are almost impossible to answer.

There are several reasons for this. One is that Canada's history as a country is just over 150 years, hardly enough time to develop national traditions. Second is the size of the country. The atmosphere and daily lives of people who live in the Atlantic region, or French-speaking Quebec, are a world away from the Pacific Coast of my native Vancouver.

Third is that the Canadian population is made up of immigrants from numerous ethnic and linguistic backgrounds (I, myself, was born in England and moved to Canada as an infant). Many immigrants keep cultural ties to the 'old country', at least for a generation or two.

I think our lack of deep traditions makes it easier for Canadians to relocate to other parts of the world. We are less bound by habit and are therefore usually able to adapt to new cultures. In fact, I'd say that many Canadians seek out older, more established cultures precisely because we don't really have that at home.

Finally, I'd like you to know one thing that Canadians generally dislike: That is, automatically being thought of as Americans. Of course, we share some cultural features with the U.S., much of the landscape might look similar, and to untrained ears, we often sound like Americans. But this is not because Canadians dislike our southern neighbours, as we have so much in common, but rather, because we identify as something different, even if that something is often difficult to pin down.
